Expectations

- This year our focus is to prepare your child for the transition to Secondary School.
- We aim to ensure that they have the skills and confidence in order to be successful in taking their next steps in their education.

Ready for Secondary School

- If you wish your child to walk home independently after school, then please complete and return the form which was given out last week. The form is also available from the school office.
 - Children walking and bringing in mobile phones should use them responsibly. They should not use phones within school grounds, and it will be switched off and kept safely in the teacher's cupboard during the day. Throughout the year we will provide sessions on safe use of technology.
- Please note that all pupils must be collected from an after school club.



Walking home alone guidance

- Children must be in Year 6.
- Parents must have registered with the school that they are prepared for their children to walk directly
 home from school at the end of the day.
- Children who are attending a club after school must be collected and will not be allowed to walk home alone.
- It is the parent's responsibility to check the route that their children will walk home in order that they
 may make an assessment of the appropriateness of the journey. Crossing of fast roads and walking
 through secluded areas is to be discouraged. A single route should be agreed.
- Parents must be certain that children have an awareness and understanding of the green cross code and stranger danger. It is the parent's responsibility to ensure they are sufficiently happy that their child is capable of undertaking the proposed journey safely.
- During winter months and/or inclement weather, children must be dressed appropriately.
- Children should preferably walk in a group and not alone.
- Children should have their mobile on their person on the day they are walking home alone.
- There must be someone at home to meet the child on their arrival. If the school has knowledge that there won't be anyone at home to welcome the child, the school reserves the right to inform relevant safeguarding agencies.
- Any child must be capable of arriving home within 20 minutes of the end of the school day. Journeys
 over 20 minutes are not considered appropriate for children at this stage.
- The school reserves the right to refuse permission for a child to walk home alone depending on the distance and concerns the school may have at that time.

SATS

• Part of the preparation for Secondary School involves SATs. These are a range of tests and tasks for assessment in Year 6.

 They are largely used as a judgement of how well schools are performing.

 They are a useful diagnostic tool to let KS3 know what parts of the Maths and English curriculum children are ready to access.

SATS

• The Government has allocated this year's SATs to take place from Monday May to Thursday th May 2026.

 During the course of the year, we prepare the children for these so that they know what to expect.

 We will do some sets of SATS papers throughout the year and some specific teaching in class. Please be reassured that we are careful to keep a balance between Year 6 curriculum work and good preparation of the SATS so the children feel they can do their best.

Reading - Lomework

- We encourage all children to read regularly at home. This should be a minimum of 3 times a week.
- All children will have a levelled reading book, for which they will earn certificates.
- Certificates will be awarded for the number of reading sessions completed: 10, 25, 50, 75. At 100 they will earn a badge. Certificates continue and further badges awarded every 100 reads.
- The length of reading session will be differentiated for your child.

• The level book and their reading diary should go between home and school daily.



 In addition, the children will have a book to read for pleasure. This will either be from the class library or a book of their choice from home.

Reading

 We encourage the children to read a diverse selection of books and they can earn rewards for this by completing a bingo card. (This will be in their reading diary).

Times Tables Homework

- The National Curriculum states that children should know times tables facts by the end of Year 4.
- Through the use of Times Tables Rockstars, we encourage children to practise and learn multiplication and division facts on a regular basis.
- If your child has not yet earned their Times Tables badge, it is important that we support them to do so soon as quickly as possible.



- After their multiplication badge, they can work towards their division, fraction and shape facts badges.
- It is important that they regularly practise their rapid recall of multiplication facts. All children with a multiplication badge will be retested this term to ensure they still remember them!
- Please ask if you think that your child does not have a TTR login.







Learning by Questions






