



### Learning

The teaching and learning follows the National Curriculum. For some subject areas we follow a published scheme of work. We expect children in Year 2 to show increased independence in their learning.

Our topic for this term will have a History and Science focus. Through a study of The Great Fire of London, children will learn the meaning of chronology, learn about events and individuals beyond living memory and build on their Year 1 learning about materials. In topic work later in the year we will learn about further historical events and significant people, continents, countries and oceans of the World, and humans, animals, habitats, and plants.

# Reading



Reading and Phonics continues to be an important focus in Year 2 and, still following the Little Wandle scheme, we move into an increased focus on reading fluency and spelling. Each week your child will bring home:

- one reading scheme book to be read to an adult 3 times and recorded in the new diary. This book should be brought to and from school each day and will be collected on Monday, to change for a new one on Tuesday
- a library book, or 'sharing book', that they have chosen to share with an adult. We expect the adult to read this to the child, modelling fluency and expression, explaining vocabulary and enjoying the experience of reading together. The children will have the opportunity to change their sharing book on Thursday if they want to.

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


### Reading

Once books are sent home, ideally, please listen to your child read every day at a time that suits you both. This might not always be in the evening when they are tired but perhaps in the morning before they come to school. It will help them to gain confidence in reading and reinforce the phonics we have been learning. Please look after school books; parents are asked to pay for damaged or lost books.

#### **Reading Awards**

Children will be awarded certificates in Celebration Assembly at 10, and then every 25, 50 and 75 reads and a reading badge at every 100 reads, up to a possible 300 reads over the whole year. They can also work towards their Reading for Pleasure Bingo Card Award which you can find half way through the back of the reading record.



### Homework

Reading regularly at home is the most valuable form of homework that we hope you will do with your child. Your child will also soon have a Numbots login to practise number fluency at home. Occasionally we may send other homework activities on Dojo.



#### **Forest School**



Mrs Maj will lead Year 2 Forest School sessions on Friday afternoons.

This term's dates are:

## What is Parton Play?

- Exciting new initiative which will launch later this half term.
- Opportunity for children to become more independent, creative, adventurous and social
- Encouraging children to use the full extent and scope of the school grounds
- Chance for older children to support younger children and for younger children to learn from older children
- A way of developing and broadening children's play experiences

## What will it actually involve?

- The entire school grounds will be divided into 'zones'
- Each zone will have a different theme
- All children will be able to access any zone during lunchtime
- Each zone will be overseen by a member of staff
- A play leader will oversee Parton Play, visiting each zone every day to check equipment and safety
- Children will need wellies and appropriate wet-weather clothing as they will use all areas all year. They will be responsible for themselves

### **Other Reminders**
